A Clear Midnight (2025) | Kahan Taraporevala (b. 1999)

This is thy hour O Soul, thy free flight into the wordless,

The Moon (2025) | Abigail Lewis (b. 2006) | Text by Robert Louis Stevenson (1850–1894)

Hold On To Freedom (2024) | David Gaedke (b. 1997)

This piece is a heartfelt psalm, reflecting on the themes of patience, suffering, and divine deliverance. It follows a structured journey from hope, to prayer, to deliverance, with each stanza deepening the connection between the speaker's experience and biblical promises.

The opening line is a common proverb - not directly found in the Bible - that echoes the sentiment of Psalm 37:7 or 2 Peter 3:9, emphasizing the importance of trusting in God's timing:

Good things come to those who wait,

And my time will come.

I've held on, it's in my fate,

I can taste freedom.

This theme of patience is woven throughout the piece, as the speaker grapples with the reality of suffering, expressing weariness and burdens similar to those in Matthew 11:28-30, where Jesus invites the weary to find rest in Him.

Weary and burdened,

heavy laden.

All those who labor,

Come unto him.

The third stanza is an original prayer for deliverance. The words, "Free me from this bondage," reflects a deep faith in God's ability to rescue and redeem, much like God's deliverance of Israel in Exodus. The declaration "You said, It is done!" echoes Christ's dying words on the cross in John 19:30, signaling a confident belief in the fulfillment of God's promises.

Bathe me in your radiant light,

I know you'll make it right.

Deliver me lord,

From suffering, pain, and sorrow.

Everything is made possible through you,

Yahweh.

You said, "It is done!"

Free me from this bondage,

Lord I ask you.

Please deliver me!

The fourth stanza brings the piece full circle and reinforces the central theme of patience. The lyrics "...hold on" are a reference to the Negro spiritual Hold On, also known as Gospel Plow. This spiritual is inspired by Jesus' words in Luke 9:62, which emphasize commitment and perseverance in following God's path. By drawing on this rich tradition, the piece taps into a legacy of spiritual resilience, underscoring the power of holding on through faith in the face of adversity.

Good things come to those who wait!

All that I have to do is wait and hold on!

To freedom!

A variation of the plagal cadence, often referred to as the "Amen" cadence, concludes the entire piece and harmonically mirrors the sense of peace and resolution that comes from trusting in God.

Die Mannsprächtige (The Man-splendid Woman) character study after Elias Canetti (2023) | Joseph Klein (b. 1962)

Die Mannsprächtige (The Man-splendid Woman) is the twenty-second in a series of short works for solo instrument based upon characters from Der Ohrenzeuge: Fünfzig Charaktere (Earwitness: Fifty Characters), written in 1974 by the Bulgarianborn British-Austrian novelist Elias Canetti (1905–1994). Canetti's distinctive studies incorporate poetic imagery, singular insights, and unabashed wordplay to create fifty ironic paradigms of human behavior. This collection, begun in 1997, was inspired by the vividly surreal depictions of Canetti's characters, and comprises twenty-two solo works to date—composed for familiar instruments such as violin, guitar, piano, and trombone, as well as less common instruments such as ocarina, cimbalom, glass harmonica, and carillon. In Canetti's depiction of this character, the man-splendid woman "likes to stand... slowly lifting her arm aloft, and holding it aloft with a carefully studied gesture. When all the onlookers close their dazzled eyes, she drops her arm.... She does not say a word, what could she say anyway to heighten her splendor, she holds her tongue, and her silence speaks volumes... Perfection belongs to no one and requires distance, that, and that alone, is why she stares into the distance."

Die Mannsprächtige was composed in May-June 2023 for harpist Jaymee Haefner.
