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SYNOPSIS AND DIRECTOR'S NOTES

UNT Opera brings to life an original reworking of Georges Bizet's timeless masterpiece in a condensed, action-packed production.

Set in Seville, Spain, Carmen tells the story of Don José, a military officer who abandons his girlfriend Micaëla along with his military career to win the love of Carmen, a fiery, bold Roma dancer, and part of a gang of smugglers. After a few months of passion with José, however, Carmen tires of him and falls for Escamillo the bullfighter. Blinded by jealousy and rage, José takes revenge on Carmen...

This version of *Carmen* extracts the essence of the tragic opera and presents the work as a fast-paced, intimate music drama. It also focuses on the role of destiny in the Roma world, and on the Roma notion that once a fate is foretold, it cannot be prevented.

The opera has been re-orchestrated for something akin to a flamenco band to add a special flare to the Spanish-inspired music.

The opera is performed in two acts with one fifteen minute intermission.

ARTISTIC TEAM

JONATHAN EATON (Stage Director and creator of this version of Carmen) serves UNT as director of opera and the Winspear chair in opera studies. His work as a stage director has been seen in North America at many opera companies, including Chicago Lyric, San Francisco Opera, Philadelphia Opera, New York City Opera (with productions broadcast nationwide on "Great Performances Live from Lincoln Center"), Indianapolis, Memphis and Syracuse operas, the Santa Fe and Spoleto festivals, the Canadian Opera, Vancouver Opera, and here in Texas at Dallas Opera. In Europe he has directed at The Royal Opera Covent Garden, the English, Welsh and Dutch



national operas, the operas of Lyons, Nantes and Nancy, and several German opera houses, including Hannover, Bielefeld, Dessau, Würzburg and Bochum. He led !SING for Ruhr 2010, Cultural Capital of Europe, with a million singers in 53 cities singing 500 concerts, culminating in the world's largest staged concert with 58,000 singers in a soccer stadium, televised by WDR and broadcast across Europe. He served for 21 years as artistic director of Pittsburgh Festival Opera, where he directed more than forty operas, including their first Ring cycle with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, and a strina of new works he commissioned under the rubric Music that Matters. These include an eco-opera inspired by Rachel Carson, and a jazz/gospel opera addressing issues of racial tension. Mr. Eaton is a celebrated interpreter of the works of Kurt Weill with several British and American premieres of Weill's works to his credit, including Der Protagonist, Der Tsar läßt sich photographieren, Der Silbersee, Royal Palace and Die Bürgschaft. Mr. Eaton has also held professorships at CCM in Cincinnati, Carnegie Mellon University and Cleveland Institute of Music.

WILLEM VAN SCHALKWYK (Conductor and Coach) applauded by the Salt Lake City Tribune for "maturity beyond his years" and "dizzying technical facility," has concertized throughout the United States, Europe, South America, and Southern Africa - most recently in France and Mexico. Willem regularly returns to his homeland of Namibia for concert appearances, and some notable events include playing the Rachmaninoff Third Piano Concerto and the Tchaikovsky First Piano Concerto with the Namibia National Symphony Orchestra, and presenting a solo recital as part of the National Theatre of Namibia's 25-year anniversary celebrations. As a collaborative



artist Willem has performed with instrumentalists from the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago, San Francisco and Utah symphonies, as well as the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. As vocal coach and pianist, Willem has served with companies that include the Santa Fe Opera, Utah Opera, Taos Opera Institute, AIMS program in Austria, Arizona Opera, Opera Fort Collins, and Opera in the Ozarks. From 2014 until 2019, Willem was assistant professor of piano and opera/vocal coaching at the University of Northern Colorado, and joined the University of North Texas faculty in the fall of 2020 as the opera coach.

STEPHANIE RHODES RUSSELL (Director of Music for Opera and Coach for Carmen) recently completed a residency as conducting fellow with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra where she appeared regularly with the ensemble leading education, family, and community concerts while serving as cover conductor for the symphonic subscription series. She is the recipient of a 2019 Solti Foundation U.S. Career Assistance Award, designed to aid outstanding young conductors in developing their talents and careers. She has served on the music staff of the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia, The Dallas Opera, Houston Grand Opera, LA Opera, San Francisco Opera,



and Washington National Opera; her extensive operatic experience as assistant conductor, prompter, chorus master, rehearsal pianist, and diction coach brings a comprehensive understanding to her work. Other recent engagements include concerts with the American Festival Chorus and Orchestra, performances of Handel's Alcina at the University of Michigan Ann Arbor, Washington National Opera's forum for new works, the American Opera Initiative, and The Magic Flute and Dido and Aeneas with the Miami Music Festival, Highlights as an assistant conductor include work on two Wagner Ring cycles with conductors Philippe Auguin and Donald Runnicles and productions of *Iolanta*, Eugene Onegin, and Queen of Spades with Emmanuel Villaume and Carlo Rizzi. As founder and Board chair of the non-profit Women's Artistic Leadership Initiative (Women's ALI), she is dedicated to the education and empowerment of young female artists, training them to become future community leaders. An alum of the Dallas Opera's Institute for Women Conductors, the Houston Grand Opera Studio and San Francisco's Merola Opera program, she holds degrees in collaborative piano and piano performance from the University of Michigan and Utah State University, respectively, and completed a doctorate in orchestral conducting at the University of Utah.

TAYLOR RACHEL CARNES (Associate Director) is currently the first stage director in the Graduate Artist Certificate Program in Opera at the University of North Texas, where she directed productions of Previn's A Streetcar Named Desire and Trouble in Tahiti. She is a 2022–2023 recipient of the National Opera Association's JoElyn Wakefield-Wright Stage Director Fellowship. Taylor has worked with LA Opera, The Glimmerglass Festival, Boston Lyric Opera, Aspen Opera Center, Opera UCLA, and Austin Opera.



JON FELT (Lighting Design) works with local venues including theaters, churches and performing arts centers to provide lighting design services. He earned his degree from Texas Woman's University in Denton. Customers have included Chase Oaks Church, St. Andrew UMC, UNT College of Music, Theatre Three, and Amphibian Stage Productions. He has experience working with Onyx, Eos, MA, Vista and Hog consoles. Jonathan can provide everything from advice and guidance regarding lighting systems, networking and controls to design and programming services.



DANILA KOROGODSKY (Set and Costume Designer) comes from St. Petersburg, Russia where he studied at the Leningrad Theater Institute and then worked as a resident designer at the Theater for Young Spectators. After his first show in the United States at HTY Honolulu in 1989, he designed and taught in America for twenty years. For Opera Theater of Pittsburgh, working with Jonathan Eaton, he designed productions of *The Ring, Magic Flute*, A View from the Bridge and Lost in the Stars. He was the head of stage design at California State University, Long Beach, and resident designer at the California Repertory Company. Cal Rep productions include: Dante Club,



Knights of the Round Table, Lamark, Ivona Princess of Burgundia, Among the Chosen Few, Pilgrims. Other venues include: Die Bürgschaft and Die Vögel, Spoleto Festival USA; Between Two Worlds, Lyric Opera of Chicago; Queen of Spades, Nantes Opera, France; Uncle Vanya, Bonn City Theatre, Germany; Little, Actors Gana, Los Angeles; Curlew River, Japan Society, NY; Reluctant Dragon, Minneapolis Children Theater; Ithaka, Pittsburgh Playhouse. In 2005 he became an artistic director of Pokoleniy Theater in St. Petersburg. He has directed more then 20 projects in the last 18 years with his company. In 2015 he had a solo exhibit of his work showing at the Bahrushensky State Theater Art Museum in Moscow and had an album of his work published by the museum in cooperation with Theater Pokoleniy. His production of Sophocles' Antigone was invited to the Chur Theater Festival in Switzerland in November 2007 as part of a program of the best new European Theater. In autumn 2019 his show "M" based on Fritz Lang's screenplay for his movie "M" toured Switzerland and Germany as did his show "67/871" about the siege of Leningrad, which opened in Berlin in 2016.

ASHLEY H. WHITE (Fight Choreographer) is an award-winning director, fight & intimacy director, and teaching artist, with international credits and nearly two decades of experience. She is a certified intimacy director with IDC Professionals. As an ID, she has worked across the United States, in addition to film & television, where her intimacy coordination work can be seen on Amazon, The CW, Paramount+, among other networks and studios. She is an accomplished fight director and is a certified teacher with the Society of American Fight Directors. Ashley is a sought-after educator and is the creator of The



Cycle of Consent – an approach to building and navigating safe creative spaces. She is the recipient of 5 DFW Critics Forum Awards for Outstanding Direction as well as special recognitions from the Critics Forum for her fight & intimacy work. Ashley is a proud member of SDC, and has received nominations for the SDC Zelda Fischander and SDC Barbara Whitman awards for innovation in directing.

ANTONIO ARREBOLA (Dance Choreographer) began his dance studies at the Conservatorio Superior de Danza in Málaga, where he was trained in flamenco, ballet clásico and clásico español and studied with Susana Lupiañez, Ricardo Caña, and Valentina Letova. Antonio has been dancing professionally since the age of fifteen. He has danced in many prominent tablaos in Andalucía, such as the Christina Hoyos Flamenco Museum and many more. Antonio has also been recognized on the international



scene, elating audiences in The Netherlands, Switzerland, Germany, Poland, Italy, Morocco, Canada, the United States and Japan. He worked with the Maria Serrano Company in the show Flamentango in Canada; in addition, he has toured in Europe with his own company. He headlined the Dallas Flamenco Festival in 2010, 2012, and 2013 and was featured in the Dallas Flamenco Festival and Ochre House Theater's productions of Perro y Sangre, El Conde Drácula, Buñuel Descending and Picasso: Matador de Málaga.

SARA STEELE, originally from Missouri, is an active collaborative pianist and vocal coach. Ms. Steele has an affinity for opera and is passionate about helping singers achieve excellence. A Presser Award winner, Steele has performed at Carnegie Hall as a winner of the chamber music division of the Semper Pro Musica Competition. Sara has performed with the Springfield Symphony Orchestra and adjudicated the Martha Guengerich Piano Festival in Missouri. She is on faculty at the Colorado Vocal Institute, and was on faculty at the Music in the



Marche and Brancaleoni International Music Festival. Ms. Steele is working on the DMA in collaborative piano and graduate artist certificate in opera coaching at UNT, where she is a graduate assistant for UNT Opera. In 2022, Sara was the music director for UNT Opera's production of *Trouble in Tahiti*. She holds two master of music degrees, one in collaborative piano and the other in performance and pedagogy, both from Baylor University, and a bachelor's in piano performance from Southwest Baptist University.

SOLOISTS

HAWKINS BURNS, baritone, is a senior from Austin, Texas studying vocal performance with Stephen Morscheck. Hawkins works with churches in the DFW area and often is a featured soloist at The Chapel of the Cross in Dallas. This year Hawkins will perform in the chorus of Mozart's *Le nozze di Figaro* and will be featured as Moralès in Bizet's *Carmen* in the spring. Hawkins will pursue a master's in psychology and hopes to do work in music therapy while performing.

ISAAC CARLIN, baritone, is a 2nd year graduate student from Omaha, Nebraska, studying vocal performance with Stephen Austin. Isaac received his undergraduate degree in voice performance from Brigham Young University. Isaac has performed the roles of Junius (*The Rape of Lucretia*) and Escamillo (*Carmen*) with UNT Opera. Other recent opera roles include Papageno (*Die Zauberflöte*) and Falke (*Die Fledermaus*) with BYU Opera.

BRIAN DE STEFANO, baritone, is from Glenview, Illinois. They are a third-year music student, double majoring in music education and vocal performance with a minor in music theory, studying voice with William Joyner. Brian is a member of UNT's A Cappella Choir and early music ensemble Vox Aquilae, both under the direction of Dr. Allen Hightower. Brian previously appeared in the chorus of the UNT Opera production of Mozart's *Le nozze di Figaro*, and continues to be on the stage management team of UNT Opera's touring production of Bizet's *Carmen*.

KADIN ELEADORA, tenor, is a senior from Puerto Rico studying vocal performance with Jeffrey Snider at the University of North Texas. Gonzalez has previously attended Tarrant County Community College where recent roles include Don Curzio (*Le nozze Di Figaro*) and Peter Pan (*Shrek the Musical*). Gonzalez has received 2nd Place in the NATS Music Theatre TTB as well as Outstanding Performance in the NATS Music Theatre TTB in 2020. Gonzalez has had past experience with piano and violin and has won UlL Solo and Ensembles from 2015–2018. Upcoming roles and jobs are Don Curzio in *Le nozze Di Figaro*, assistant director in *Così fan tutte* at Music On Site Inc., and Remendado in *Carmen* at UNT.

TAYLOR FENNER, soprano, is a 1st year master's student from Brookings, South Dakota and graduate of Augustana University. She is studying vocal performance with Jennifer Lane. This summer, she attended the Berlin Opera Academy at the Joseph Schmidt Musikschule. Recent roles include Ida (Die Fledermaus) with Berlin Opera Academy and Countess (The Marriage of Figaro), Sophia (The Ransom of Sophia), and Celié (Signor Deluso) with Augustana Opera Theater. Taylor also sings with the UNT A Cappella Choir. Roles with UNT Opera include Susanna (Le nozze di Figaro) and Micaëla in Carmen.

JACK FORDEN, tenor, is originally from Plano, Texas. He is a fourth year vocal performance major studying with Stephen Austin. With UNT Opera, he has performed roles such as Vasek (*The Bartered Bride*), Normanno (*Lucia di Lammermoor*), and Sheldon Segal (*Later the Same Evening*). He has also performed in the UNT Opera chorus in *Don Giovanni*, Mark Blitzstein's *Regina*, *Orfeo ed Euridice*, and *L'elisir d'amore*. His operatic work outside of UNT includes two productions of *Le nozze di Figaro*, one at the TCU summer opera workshop where he was both Basilio and Curzio and the other with Red River Lyric Opera as just Basilio. Also with Red River Lyric Opera, he has portrayed Tobias (*Sweeney Todd*).

CECIL GARRISON, tenor, is in his first year in UNT's DMA program studying with Stephen F. Austin. His graduate studies were at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, and undergraduate studies at the University of New Mexico. Notable past roles include Giles Corey in Robert Ward's *The Crucible* with SMU's Meadows Lyric Theatre, and the Bartender from Michael Ching's *Speed Dating Tonight!* with UNM Opera Theatre. Outside of opera, Cecil is a choral conductor and coach, guest lecturer, oratorio soloist, composer and arranger. Cecil will play Don José in this season's production of *Carmen*.

MIAROSE HANBERRY, soprano, is a Dallas-based singer, actress, multiinstrumentalist, voice teacher, model, and songwriter from Orange Grove, Texas. With over 15 years of training and performance experience, MiaRose has been seen in venues ranging from the Moores Opera House in Houston, Texas to the Sydney Opera House in Sydney, Australia. MiaRose was most recently seen as Esmeralda in the Moores Opera Center's production of The Bartered Bride, and as Crystal in the University of Houston's new production of Little Shop of Horrors. In the summer of 2022, Hanberry was a top-10 semifinalist in the Nina International Solo Voice Competition for Young Voices in Bergen, Norway, as part of the Grieg Festival. In addition to her soaring soprano range and highly-regarded acting, Hanberry is also a skilled pianist, guitarist, and alto-saxophonist. A voice teacher with over 5 years of experience, MiaRose recently received her bachelor of music in vocal performance from the University of Houston's Moores School of Music, araduating with honors. She is currently pursuing her master of music in performance at the University of North Texas with William Joyner.

SARAH HARVEY, mezzo-soprano, graduated from Texas A&M University-Commerce with a degree in music education with a focus in secondary education. There she performed the role of Magda (*The Path to Heaven*), and performed in *Silver Linings* and *Obsessions*. She is a member of Mu Phi Epsilon, and served as their Chorister at TAMUC. In Fall 2018 she participated in the regional NATS and placed 4th in the senior division. She is completing a MM degree from UNT this semester in the studio of Stephen Morscheck.

LWAZI HLATI, tenor, is originally from Johannesburg, South Africa, currently doing his graduate artistic certificate at UNT with William Joyner. He earned his bachelor's in vocal performance from Tshwane University of Technology in Pretoria, South Africa; his performer's diploma and master of music in vocal performance from Southern Methodist University. As one of Johannesburg's most sought-after tenors, he's gained recognition for his performances as Ferrando (Così fan tutte) and Fenton (Falstaff). In 2017 he was selected by the Med Ent company as one of three South African tenors to perform throughout Greece and Turkey for a season of tribute concerts to the world-renowned group II Divo and Three Tenors. Most recently, he's performed in Bass Hall as Gastone (La Traviata), Porgy and Bess with Fort Worth Opera, Ferrando (Così fan tutte) with SMU as part of his graduate studies, Edgardo (Lucia di Lammermoor) with Opera in the Ozarks, and worked with the Fort Worth Opera's education department putting on children's operas Hansel and Gretel, Stone Soup and Frida Kahlo and The Bravest Girl in the World. Upcoming roles with UNT Opera include Don José (Carmen) and Harold Mitchell (A Streetcar Named Desire).

SUNYOUNG KIM, soprano, is a master's student from Seoul, South Korea, studying vocal performance with Daniel Bubeck. She recently earned 4th place in the Adult Treble classical voice DFW area chapter in NATS, April 2022. Upcoming roles with UNT Opera include Fortune Teller (*Carmen*). In 2018–2019, she participated in a masterclass of Loraine Nubar and Dalton Boldwin in Académie Internationale D'été de Nice, France, and performed at the recital. She is an actor, making her debut in theatre as Grand Duchess (*Les Justes*) in 2013. She has been active in theatre, movie and drama. Ms. Kim holds a bachelor of science in nursing from Ewha Womans University, and a master of music course certificate in vocal performance from Kookmin University.

HYEJIN LEE, soprano, is a third-year DMA vocal performance student from South Korea, studying with Carol Wilson. She did her master's degree at the Arrigo Boito Conservatory of Parma in Italy and the New England Conservatory in Boston. Recent roles include Lauretta (*Gianni Schicchi*) with Huntington Theatre in Boston and Mimì (*La bohème*) with Politeama Theatre (Politeama Pratese) and Bologna Cultural Arts Center (Circolo Culturale Lirico Bolognese) in Italy. She is in the A Cappella Choir and receives a choir scholarship.

CHRISTOPHER RODRIGUEZ, baritone, is a second-year doctoral student and teaching fellow at the University of North Texas. He is originally from Bakersfield, California and attended California State University, Fresno where he received his bachelor and master of arts in vocal performance and was the inaugural recipient of the Edna Garabedian Vocal Performance Award. He has recently performed the roles of Figaro (Le nozze di Figaro), Papageno (Die Zauberflöte), Sam (Trouble in Tahiti), Narciso (Bless Me, Ultima) and created the roles Stanton (State of Jefferson) and Everybody (Lucinda y las Flores de la Nochebuena) under the batons of Thomas Loewenheim and Ryan Murray. He has sung the baritone solos for Ligeti's Aventures, Duruflé's Requiem, and Fauré's Requiem under Garrison Gerard, Cari Earnhart and Dale Fleck. This Fall he will sing Beto (La Bruja Anam y la Bella Beatrice) with Diversità Opera Arts Company, Antonio (Le nozze di Figaro) with UNT Opera, Eight Songs for a Mad King with UNT Nova, and Edgar's Shadow (Tell Tale Heart) with Opera Modesto. Christopher is a voice student of Carol Wilson.

ZACHARY ROHWER, baritone, is a junior from Flower Mound, Texas studying voice performance and music education with William Joyner. Roles with UNT Opera include chorus in *Le nozze di Figaro* and Moralès (*Carmen*).

LAUREN SALAZAR, soprano, is a second year M.M. in voice studying under the tutelage of Carol Wilson. She holds a B.M. in voice performance and a B.S. in public relations from The University of Texas at Austin, as well as a M.S. in hospitality management from University of North Texas. Her previous roles include Gianetta (*The Gondoliers*) with TEXAS Opera, Eula (*TEXAS Outdoor Musical Drama*) with TEXAS Outdoor Musical, Lucia (*The Rape of Lucretia*) and The Girl - Trio (*Trouble in Tahiti*) with UNT Opera, Amahl (*Amahl and the Night Visitors*) with Music on Site Inc., Annio (*La clemenza di Tito*) and Papagena (*Die Zauberflöte*) with the Butler Opera Center, and Laurey (*Oklahoma!*) with the New Braunfels Theatre Company. This spring she will perform as Carmen (*Carmen*) with UNT Opera.

AVERY SANDERLIN, baritone, is a junior from Houston, Texas studying vocal performance with Carol Wilson. He is currently a member of the UNT A Cappella Choir and Vox Aquilae under the direction of Allen Hightower. Upcoming roles with UNT Opera include Antonio in *Le nozze di Figaro* and Papageno in the Scenes program, and Zuniga in *Carmen*.

SAMANTHA SCHMITZ, mezzo-soprano, is a first-year master's student from Westphalia, Iowa studying vocal performance with Molly Fillmore. She earned her bachelor's degree from Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa. Samantha recently participated in the Lyric Opera Studio Weimar in Weimar, Germany. She was also featured with the Iowa State University Symphony Orchestra as winner of the 2020 University Concerto Competition. Recent roles include Dritte Dame (Die Zauberflöte), Armelinde (Cendrillon), Hansel (Hansel and Gretel), and Public Opinion (Orpheus in the Underworld).
