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DIRECTOR'S NOTE AND SYNOPSIS

Take a bold new look at this classic story, told in rapturous French Romantic music. We find ourselves initially in a university library: students are milling around, misbehaving; the janitor (Cinders) casts longing eyes at the football team captain... She loves to read, however, and falls asleep at a desk... in her dreams she and her heartthrob come together in a retelling of the Cinderella story – but this is one with a difference, as the modern and the dream worlds overlap.

Act I

An invitation to the ball...

Faced with a shrew of a wife, demanding step-daughters and unhappy servants, Pandolfe recalls the simplicity of his former days living alone with his daughter Cendrillon. He resolves to assert his authority and spare Cendrillon from the bullying of her new relations. Meanwhile, Cendrillon's stepmother and sisters prepare to go to a ball, where they hope to attract the attention of the Prince. Cendrillon however is to be left at home.

The Fairy Godmother does her magic

As Cendrillon sleeps, her Fairy Godmother appears, conjuring a magical gown from starlight and moonbeams as well as glass slippers which will disguise Cendrillon from her relatives. But the enchantment will break at midnight, so Cendrillon must make sure to return home before then.

Act II

And their eyes meet over a crowded room...

The Prince is melancholy. His father, the King, reminds him that he must choose a wife. Eligible princesses present themselves to him, but none of them catches his eye. A beautiful stranger – Cendrillon in disguise – arrives, and she and the Prince fall instantly in love. The clock begins to strike midnight and Cendrillon flees, losing a glass slipper as she goes.

Act III

Midnight has struck...

The family returns from the ball, angrily discussing the beautiful stranger. Ultimately they dismiss her as a passing fancy; the Prince couldn't possibly love such a harridan. Cendrillon, believing them, nearly faints with horror.

An inconsolable daughter...

Comforting the weeping Cendrillon, Pandolfe promises to take her away with him to live in his country home. But Cendrillon cannot be consoled, and runs out into the cold night with dire intentions, refusing to continue to be a burden to her father.

An enchanted encounter - their hands touch...

The Fairy Godmother conjures spirits and a magical bower, bringing Cendrillon and the Prince together at a magic oak tree for a mystical ceremony of love. They exchange their vows, their hands meet, then they fall into a magical sleep, perchance to dream...

Act IV

Was it all but a dream?

Months have passed since Pandolfe found his daughter wandering by the oak tree and took her home. Delirious, she half wakes, telling her father all that has passed. But he tells her it was only a dream. It is now spring, and the Prince summons all the women of the kingdom to try on the glass slipper, in the hope of finding his beloved. Convinced that one of her daughters must be the Prince's true love (or she herself?!), Madame de la Haltière hurries them off to the palace. Now recovered, this time, Cendrillon goes with them.

A happy ending!

Cendrillon tries on the slipper and the Prince recognises his mysterious beauty from the ball. The two lovers are reunited, and the whole court rejoices.

ARTISTIC TEAM



ALEX AMSEL (Conductor) is Argentinian-Mexican. He has quickly established himself as a conductor equally at home on orchestral and operatic podiums, as well as a music educator for students of all ages. Amsel's hope is to integrate music into the fabric of every community he works with to reshape how we think about society and our place in it. Amsel joins the Phoenix Symphony as associate conductor for the 2023–2024 season where he will lead classical and education concerts. As a music director finalist for the Elgin Symphony in Illinois, he led "a vibrant and textured account maintaining superb balance so its many intricacies came through...

punctuating a dynamic performance" (Chicago Classical Review). Additional debut engagements for 2023-24 include the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, Waco Symphony Orchestra, and a tour with West Virginia Symphony. He joined the Houston Grand Opera as resident conductor for the 2022–2023 season with productions of Verdi's La traviata at the Wortham Theatre and world-premiere production of Jeremy Howard Beck's Another City. Amsel was appointed assistant conductor by Robert Spano for the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra where he led the orchestra in symphonic, chamber and education/outreach concerts. Firmly committed to educating promising musicians, Amsel is music director for University of North Texas's production of Massenet's Cendrillon during the Fall of 2023. Additionally, he has been on faculty and conducted festivals such as Aspen Music Festival, National Repertory Orchestra, and Texas Festival Orchestra at Round Top amongst others. Amsel holds a master of music in orchestral conducting from the Peabody Conservatory studying under the tutelage of Marin Alsop where he was choir master and assistant conductor for the Opera Theatre, and symphonies, and choruses. He was selected for the prestigious Aspen Conducting Academy for the 2020 and 2021 summers and has worked closely with Cristian Mācelaru, Robert Spano, Patrick Summers, and Miguel Harth-Bedoya. During his free time, Amsel is a biking, architecture, wine, and Golden Retriever aficionado.



JONATHAN EATON (Stage Director) serves UNT as Director of Opera and the Winspear Chair in Opera Studies. His work as a stage director has been seen in North America at many opera companies, including Chicago Lyric, San Francisco Opera, Philadelphia Opera, New York City Opera (with productions broadcast nationwide on "Great Performances Live from Lincoln Center"), Indianapolis, Memphis and Syracuse operas, the Santa Fe and Spoleto festivals, the Canadian Opera, Vancouver Opera, and here in Texas at Dallas Opera. In Europe he has directed at The Royal Opera Covent Garden, the English,

Welsh and Dutch national operas, the operas of Lyons, Nantes and Nancy, and several German opera houses, including Hannover, Bielefeld, Dessau, Würzburg and Bochum. He led !SING for Ruhr 2010, Cultural Capital of Europe, with a million singers in 53 cities singing 500 concerts, culminating in the world's largest staged concert with 58,000 singers in a soccer stadium, televised by WDR and broadcast across Europe. He served for 21 years as artistic director of Pittsburgh Festival Opera, where he directed more than forty operas, including their first Ring cycle with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, and a string of new works he commissioned under the rubric Music that Matters. These include an eco-opera inspired by Rachel Carson, and a jazz/gospel opera addressing issues of racial tension. Mr. Eaton is a celebrated interpreter of the works of Kurt Weill with several British and American premieres of Weill's works to his credit, including Der Protagonist, Der Tsar läßt sich photographieren, Der Silbersee, Royal Palace and Die Bürgschaft. Mr. Eaton has also held professorships at CCM in Cincinnati, Carnegie Mellon University and Cleveland Institute of Music.



EMILY JENSEN (Choreographer) is an educator, dancemaker, and performer based in the Dallas-Fort Worth, Texas area. She serves as an adjunct professor of dance at the University of North Texas. She is also the coach assistant of the Texas Woman's University Pioneer Pride Dance Team. Emily graduated with her MFA in dance from Texas Woman's University in 2023, her BA in dance education from the same institution in 2020, and her AA in dance from Kilgore College in 2017. Emily's twenty years in professional movement trainina spans several aenres

including modern, jazz, tap, hip hop, contemporary, musical theatre, and ballet. She has premiered stage and video dance works within concert, competition, and festival spaces both locally and internationally. Emily grows her scholarship through writing and presentations, having recently presented at the National Dance Organization's National Conference in Denver, CO. She is also in the process of co-writing a chapter for *The Oxford Handbook of Ballet Pedagogy*. Her research involves dance ecologies, exploring intersectional relationships between viewers, dancers, objects,

sounds, spaces, etc. -- and how they may shift -- within her interdisciplinary work. Emily is thankful to be involved in the UNT community. She recently served as choreographer for UNT Theatre's *Peter and the Starcatcher*, rehearsal director for UNT Dance's guest artist Tiffanee Arnold of Full Circle Dance, and UNT Opera's *Cendrillon*. Emily looks forward to continuing her work with the incredible students and faculty at UNT!



STEPHANIE RHODES RUSSELL (Music Director) recently completed a residency as conducting fellow with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra where she appeared regularly with the ensemble leading education, family, and community concerts while serving as cover conductor for the symphonic subscription series. She is the recipient of a 2019 Solti Foundation U.S. Career Assistance Award, designed to aid outstanding young conductors in developing their talents and careers. She has served on the music staff of the Bolshoi Theatre of Russia, The Dallas Opera, Houston Grand Opera, LA Opera, San Francisco Opera, and Washington

National Opera, amongst others, and her extensive operatic experience in the roles of assistant conductor, prompter, chorus master, rehearsal pianist, and diction coach, brings a comprehensive understanding to her work. Other recent engagements include concerts with the American Festival Chorus and Orchestra, performances of Handel's *Alcina* at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, an engagement with Washington National Opera's forum for new works, the American Opera Initiative, and *The Magic Flute* and *Dido and Aeneas* with the Miami Music Festival.



WILLEM VAN SCHALKWYK (Chorusmaster), applauded by the Salt Lake City Tribune for "maturity beyond his years" and "dizzying technical facility," has concertized throughout the United States, Europe, South America, and Southern Africa - most recently in France and Mexico. Willem regularly returns to his homeland of Namibia for concert appearances, and some notable events include playing the Rachmaninoff Third Piano Concerto and the Tchaikovsky First Piano Concerto with the Namibia National Symphony Orchestra, and presenting a solo recital as part of the National Theatre of Namibia's 25-year anniversary celebrations. As a collaborative

artist Willem has performed with instrumentalists from the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago, San Francisco and Utah symphonies, as well as the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. As voca coach and pianist, Willem has served with companies that include the Santa Fe Opera, Utah Opera, Taos Opera Institute, AIMS program in Austria, Arizona Opera, Opera Fort Collins, and Opera in the Ozarks. From 2014 until 2019, Willem was assistant professor of piano and opera/vocal coaching at the University of Northern Colorado, and joined the University of North Texas faculty in the fall of 2020 as the Opera coach.



SHUYI LI (Assistant Stage Director), soprano from Beijing, China, is a first year DMA student and teaching fellow at the University of North Texas under the tutelage of Dr. Carol Wilson. Ms. Li earned her master's degree in vocal performance from Indiana University and her bachelor's degree in vocal performance from Eastman School of Music and Central Conservatory of Music, Beijing. Most recently Ms. Li has performed the roles of Lauretta (Gianni Schicchi), Suor Genovieffa / Una conversa (Suor Angelica) with Bay View Music Festival; Cupid (Orpheus in the Underworld) with Hawaii Performing Arts Festival; Kate (The Pirates of Penzance) with Cedar Rapids

Opera. Her other credits include Lizzie (Goblin Market) with Eastman Opera Theater, Papagena (Die Zauberflöte) with Beijing Concert Hall. Ms. Li has also performed scenes as the roles of Susanna (Le nozze di Figaro), Flaminia (Il mondo della luna), Zerlina (Don Giovanni), Musetta (La bohème), Despina (Così fan tutte). Upcoming roles include Gretel (Hänsel und Gretel) with UNT Opera.



YU-HSUAN LU (pianist), a native of Taiwan, is currently pursuing her doctoral degree in collaborative piano at University of North Texas under the guidance of Steven Harlos and Elvia Puccinelli. She has served as a teaching assistant at UNT. She earned her master's degrees in piano performance and collaborative piano at Cleveland Institute of Music. Yu-Hsuan held the position of associate professor of piano in Huaiyin Normal University, China in 2017. She performs regularly with her colleagues and musicians in China and participated in the vocal accompaniment recording project for Jianasu Education Examination Institute. Yu-Hsuan has

been performing as a collaborative pianist throughout the United States, Taiwan and China. She also played for numerous masterclasses, including Daniel Ferro, Joel Krosnick, Eric Larsen and Raminta Lampsatis.

LAUREN KOSZYK (pianist) is currently pursuing her doctor of musical arts at the University of North Texas studying with Dr. Steven Harlos and Dr. Elvia Puccinelli. Originally from Normal, Illinois, Ms. Koszyk has given performances and presentations across Austria, Canada, Germany, Italy, and the United States. As an opera pianist, coach, or music director Ms. Koszyk has worked with Illinois Festival Opera, Midwest Institute of Opera, Music Onsite Inc., Musiktheater Bavaria, and Opera Seme. She has accompanied masterclasses given by renowned Metropolitan Opera soprani Angela Brown and Yvonne Redman. Ms. Koszyk has prepared complete productions of Amahl and the Night Visitors, Dialogues of the Carmelites, Gianni Schicchi, La bohème, L'enfant et les sortilèges, Les contes d'Hoffmann, Mese mariano, Suor Angelica, The Beautiful Bridegroom, The Old Maid and the Thief, and The Pirates of Penzance. She has assisted in productions of Aïda, Carmen, Cavalleria rusticana, Don Giovanni, and Hänsel und Gretel. Ms. Koszyk holds degrees in piano, collaborative piano, and German and currently serves as a teaching assistant for UNT Opera.

SOLOISTS



SETH BAZÁN, baritone, is a senior from Beeville, Texas, studying vocal performance with Professor William Joyner. This summer, Seth performed with the Highland Park Chorale, singing Stravinsky's Symphony of Psalms and Brahms' Ein deutsches Requiem and competed in the Handel Aria Competition. Upcoming roles include Le Roi (Cendrillon), Il maggiordomo (La rondine), and Impatient Guy/Tour Guide (The Hell-Bound Train).



GENEVIEVE CARDOS, mezzo-soprano, originally from The Gambia, earned a BA in music at Spelman College and MM at University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She currently is pursuing a DMA in vocal performance at UNT Denton, studying with Dr. Jennifer Lane. Genevieve has been featured in the roles of Mother (Amahl and the Night Visitors), Cecilia (Little Women) by Mark Adamo and chambermaid (Don Pasquale), while at University of Nebraska at Lincoln. She performed the role of Angelina (Trial By Jury). She has been featured in Arts After Dark in Eugene,

Oregon, solo performances at 2015 Spelman/Morehouse College Glee Club Christmas Carol Concert, A Night of Soloists with Atlanta University Centre Orchestra, and recital performances at Peachtree Road Lutheran Church in Atlanta, Georgia.



ISAAC CARLIN, baritone, from Omaha, Nebraska, is a first year Opera graduate artist certificate student studying under the tutelage of Dr. Stephen Morscheck. He earned a bachelor's degree in vocal performance at BYU, and a master's degree in voice performance at UNT. Isaac most recently performed the role of Escamillo (Carmen) at UNT, which he also toured around the Dallas/Fort Worth area singing the role in French, English and Spanish. He also assistant-directed UNT's recent production of André Previn's A Streetcar Named Desire. Other recent roles include Figaro (Le nozze di Figaro) and Junius (The Rape of

Lucretia) both at UNT, and Papageno (Die Zauberflöte) at BYU. Upcoming roles include The Sacristan (Tosca) in concert with the UNT Symphony Orchestra, and Peter (Hänsel und Gretel) with UNT Opera.



MADELINE FRIESEN, mezzo-soprano, is a senior vocal performance major from Olathe, Kansas. Madeline studies voice with Molly Fillmore and is a member of the UNT A Cappella Choir. This past summer, she traveled to Czechia and performed as the alto soloist in the world premiere of Milcžinsky's Oratorium with the UNT Fantasmi ensemble. Previous UNT Opera roles include Cherubino (Le nozze di Figaro) and Béatrice in a scene from Béatrice et Bénédict in the Opera Scenes program. Madeline has also appeared in the chorus of The Bartered Bride at UNT. In

2020, Madeline was a semi-finalist in the Texoma NATS competition.



MEGAN GREY, contralto, is a recent graduate of the Metropolitan Opera's Lindemann Young Artist Development Program. Megan Esther Grey is quickly gaining attention in roles large and small across the United States. Following her debut as Kate Pinkerton (Madama Butterfly) with The Metropolitan Opera in 2019, Ms. Grey has been a member of the roster for the last three years. In the 2023–2024 Season Ms. Grey will make several major debuts, including appearances as vocal soloist in Arnold Schoenberg's prolific *Pierrot Lunaire* with the NOVA ensemble under the direction of Alexander

Ravitz, Madame de la Haltière in Massenet's Cendrillon with UNT Opera, and alto soloist in Mahler's 2nd Symphony "Resurrection" with The Phoenix Symphony. In March of 2024 Ms. Grey returns to The Metropolitan Opera to cover the role of Gertrude (Roméo et Juliette). She is currently a DMA student at the University of North Texas studying with Dr. Jeffrey Snider.



MIAROSE HANBERRY, soprano, is a second year master's student from Orange Grove, Texas, studying with Professor William Joyner at the University of North Texas. She obtained her bachelor of arts degree in vocal performance from the Moores School of Music in Houston, Texas. With over 15 years of training and performance experience, MiaRose has been seen in venues ranging from the Moores Opera

House in Houston, Texas to the Sydney Opera House in Sydney, Australia. MiaRose was most recently seen as Second Woman (*Dido and Aeneas*), and as the Fortune Teller in the University of North Texas's tour of *Carmen*. MiaRose's upcoming roles with UNT Opera include Noemie (*Cendrillon*) and Lisette (*La Rondine*). In the summer of 2022, MiaRose was a top-10 semifinalist in the NINA International Solo Voice Competition for Young Voices in Bergen, Norway, as part of the Grieg Festival.



Off stage, Beatrice is also an avid supporter of opera outreach education programs, and has worked for the non-profit organizations "What is Opera, Anyway?" and "Reimagining Opera for Kids". Upcoming roles with UNT Opera include Noémie (Cendrillon) and Gretel (Hänsel und Gretel).



SARA FOSHEE, mezzo-soprano, is a junior from San Antonio, Texas studying vocal performance with Dr. Carol Wilson. In performance with UNT Opera, she will perform the role of Suzy and Lolette (La Rondine) and Lillian (That Hell-Bound Train). 
