PREPARATION FOR GEORGE CRUMB'S MAKROKOSMOS I AND II: A PEDAGOGICAL GUIDE TO EXTENDED PIANO TECHNIQUES SUITABLE FOR BEGINNING AND INTERMEDIATE PIANO STUDENTS

George Crumb sought to expand the sounds and techniques of modern pianism in his solo and chamber works for piano. His greatest contribution to the piano repertoire is *Makrokosmos I* and *II* for amplified piano. Although the work is widely known; it is typically only performed by specialists in advanced modernist repertoire because of the unfamiliar and demanding techniques that it requires. It is possible, though, for more pianists to learn this work by first mastering the techniques through preparatory pieces. The sixteen such pieces discussed in this dissertation come from different decades of the twentieth century and are in various styles, but they can all be mastered by beginner and intermediate-level students.
